Sharing Impressive Health Outcomes

Research results showed that, over a six-year period, New Ulm residents are doing better in controlling their blood pressure, LDL cholesterol, total cholesterol and triglycerides than residents in another Minnesota community. Staff from the Minneapolis Heart Institute Foundation presented the results at the American Heart Association's EPI/Lifestyle 2017 Scientific Sessions.

FACT: New Ulm residents are doing better than residents in a comparable Minnesota community at controlling:

- ✔ Blood pressure
- ✓ LDL cholesterol
- ✓ Total cholesterol
- Triglycerides

April - May 2017

Making Bicycling Easier and Safer for Everyone in New Ulm

- In an effort to encourage bicycling for physical activity and promote safety for both kids and adults, New Ulm hosted its second annual bike expo in April. The event was coordinated by the New Ulm Bike Group and other HONU Action Teams, New Ulm Park and Recreation and the Statewide Health Improvement Partnership (SHIP) serving Brown, Le Sueur, Nicollet and Waseca Counties.
- In May, the League of American Bicyclists recognized New Ulm's efforts to make bicycling safe and convenient for residents and visitors throughout the community by designating New Ulm as a Bicycle Friendly Community at the Bronze level. This means that New Ulm provides safe accommodations for bicycling and encourages people to bike for transportation and recreation, which helps improve public health, reduce traffic congestion, improve air quality and improve quality of life. The Heart of New Ulm Project, The New Ulm Bike Club and the City of New Ulm all collaborated on the application.

The events, which were coordinated by the Safe Routes to School Action Team, also help to promote physical activity for students, and build connections between families, schools and the community.

■ To promote financial and physical wellness, the New Ulm Area Chamber of Commerce and Ameriprise Financial, with promotional support from The Heart of New Ulm Project, teamed up to sponsor the third annual "Poker Walks" with area businesses. A total of 85 people participated in the walks over four weeks.

Helping Families Eat Healthier and Be More Active

A total of 30 families received the opportunity to enroll in a new family-focused program to learn practical information on how they can eat healthier and be more physically active together. New Ulm-Healthy Home Offerings via the Mealtime Environment (NU-HOME) is an 18-month research program being conducted by the University of Minnesota's Schools of Nursing, Public Health, and Kinesiology in collaboration with HONU.

Making It Easier for Everyone to Access Healthier Foods

■ To help advance its work to improve access and availability of healthier food choices throughout New Ulm, the Food Environment Action Team participated in a tour of various New Ulm food venues, including the New Ulm Community Garden, schools, the New Ulm Community Market and Co-op, the New Ulm Food Shelf, a local restaurant, senior dining service and aquaponics facility. The purpose of the tour was to determine the strengths of the food environment in the community, discuss barriers that people or organizations may encounter in finding or offering healthier options, and identify opportunities for improvement.

Making Intersections Safer for People

Walking and Biking

To improve safety for pedestrians at two busy intersections, the Coalition for Active, Safe and Healthy Streets and the Safe Routes to School Action Team worked with the City of New Ulm to install a new crosswalk sign at 5th North St. and N. Washington St., and also at 4th South St. and Payne St.

The signs are intended to remind drivers that Minnesota state law requires them to stop for pedestrians in the crosswalk. If there are no pedestrians present, there is no need to stop. The signs were funded through a grant from the Minnesota Statewide Health Improvement Partnership serving Brown, Le Sueur. Nicollet and Waseca Counties.

To help New Ulm residents experience how street design modifications can help slow traffic and make it safer for children to walk and bike to school, the Safe Routes to School Action Team, in partnership with New Ulm Area Catholic Schools, conducted a week-long safety demonstration project in September.

Temporary curb extensions, or "bump outs," were installed at 5th N. St. and N. Washington St. The demonstration was funded with the help of Active Places funding from the Center for Prevention at Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Minnesota.

September 2017

Increasing Awareness and Promoting Rules of the Road

To help ensure everyone's safety on New Ulm's sidewalks and streets, and encourage people to make smart decisions when encountering people walking and riding their bikes, the Safe Routes to School Action Team launched a year-long public safety campaign. The SEE.SAFE.SMART. campaign reminds people to SEE people walking and bicycling, act SAFE, and be SMART.

Each month, a different safety message reminds people to be aware of and alert to people who are out walking and biking in the community—especially kids. The safety messages feature photos of kids and adults from New Ulm and all of the schools in New Ulm are participating in the campaign.

The campaign was launched after Safe Routes to School Action Team members heard from parents who said it simply isn't safe for their children to walk or bike to school. They also heard concerns from parents and people throughout the New Ulm community that drivers just don't pay attention anymore, and that most everyone — whether they are walking, biking or driving — is simply not following the rules of the road.

Promoting Social Connectedness

■ To create more areas for people to connect socially, and also give shoppers a gathering area while in downtown New Ulm, the HONU Downtown Action Team and the HONU Mental Health and Wellness Action Team arranged for new tables and seating areas to be installed outside the New Ulm Area Chamber of Commerce office and Subway.

Research shows that social connectedness helps improve health by helping to decrease depression, improve self-esteem and create a sense of belonging. The idea for the tables originated from the results of a survey of downtown business owners done earlier in the year, which touched on a wide range of topics including possible aesthetic improvements. Funding was provided by New Ulm Medical Center's Charitable Contributions.

All Year-round in 2017

Bringing Together People, Partnerships and Resources to Support Our Work

- Community partners donated a total of 538 hours of volunteer time in 2017 — valued at approximately \$16,979 to further the project's mission.
- Brown County Public Health, the New Ulm Area Chamber of Commerce and New Ulm Public Schools donated meeting space totalling 60 hours in 2017.
- People throughout the community donated generously to help ensure that HONU can maintain its momentum and sustain the work. Thanks to local fundraising efforts in New Ulm, \$125,000 was raised in 2017 to fund the project after 2018, when the project's research phase led by the Minneapolis Heart Institute Foundation will end. The need is to raise \$500,000 locally by Fall 2020.
